

SECC PROTOCOL FOR COVID-19 CASES AMONG CHURCH MEMBERS AND GUESTS

If a member/guest tests positive for COVID-19, <u>regardless</u> of their vaccination status, previous infection, or lack of symptoms:

- Member/guest should seek medical care as necessary, but otherwise isolate at home and <u>not return to church services and activities until the following</u> <u>conditions are met</u>:
 - Stay home for at least 5 days since their COVID-19 symptom onset.
 - Isolation can end after day 5 if symptoms are not present or are resolving and an FDA approved/authorized COVID-19 test is negative on or after day 5 (a diagnostic test – PCR or antigen is required).
 - If unable to test or choosing not to test, and symptoms are not present or are resolving, isolation can end after day 10.
 - If fever is present, isolation should be continued until at least 24 hours have passed since fever resolution without use of fever reducing medication.
 - If symptoms, other than fever, are not resolving continue to isolate until symptoms are resolved or until after day 10.
 - Wear a well-fitting mask around others for a total of 10 days, especially in indoor settings.

If a member/guest who tested positive for COVID-19 exposed others at church:

- If other members/guests had exposure to the COVID-positive individual at church services/activities, the church should identify and notify those "close contacts" (i.e., individuals who were within six feet of an infected person for a cumulative 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period) in a way that does not reveal any personal identifying information of the COVID-19 case(s).
- We recommend that the church also notify the entire church congregation that a member/guest who was at a church service/activity tested positive for COVID-19, in a way that does not reveal any personal identifying information of the COVID-19 case(s), that all "close contacts" have been notified, and that they should monitor their symptoms and get tested if symptoms develop.

Vaccination Status Definitions:

There are now different <u>quarantine</u> protocols for exposed individuals who have or have not received a booster dose.

- **"Up-to-date"**: A person is considered up-to-date on COVID-19 vaccination if they have received a <u>booster shot</u> in addition to completing a primary COVID-19 vaccination series or are not yet recommended to receive a booster dose according to current CDC guidance.
- "Not up-to-date": A person is considered "not up-to-date" on COVID-19 vaccination if they have <u>not</u> received a booster shot and it has been more 5 months since they received the second dose in a 2-dose series (Pfizer or Moderna) or more than 2 months from a single-dose vaccine (Johnson and Johnson/Janssen).

Members/guests who are Unvaccinated OR <u>Not</u> up-to-date with their COVID-19 vaccination and have been exposed to a person with COVID-19 should follow the quarantine requirements below prior to returning to any church services/activities:

- Stay home for at least 5 days from the date of last contact with a person with COVID-19.
- Test on day 5 (a diagnostic test PCR or antigen is required).
- Quarantine can end after day 5 if symptoms are not present and a diagnostic specimen collected on day 5 or later tests negative.
- If unable to test or choosing not to test, and symptoms are not present, quarantine can end after day 10.
- Wear a well-fitting mask around others for a total of 10 days, especially in indoor settings
- If testing positive, follow isolation recommendations above.
- If symptoms develop, test, and stay home.

Members/guests who are <u>up-to-date</u> with their COVID-19 vaccination and have been exposed to a person with COVID-19 should follow the requirements below:

- May continue to participate in church services/activities without isolation.
- Test on day 5 (a diagnostic test PCR or antigen is required).
- Wear a well-fitting mask around others for 10 days, especially in indoor settings.
- If testing positive, follow isolation recommendations above.
- If symptoms develop, test, and stay home.

The church should consult with SECC administration if there are **<u>multiple cases of</u> <u>COVID-19</u>** among members and guests who attended a service or church-related function.
